Dog License

Residents of Montgomery County may buy dog licenses between December 1st -January 31st at the Moraine Administration Building, 4200 Dryden Rd. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. A license for a spayed or neutered dog costs \$20, an unaltered dog is \$24. Dogs ages 3 to 9 months are \$20 without regard to spaying/neutering. Ohio law requires all dogs over 3 months who reside in Montgomery County to be licensed. The City accepts cash only – exact change. License fees support Montgomery County Animal Resource Center operations and licensing a dog is a valuable tool in getting your pet home should they get lost.

Early History of Kreitzer Road

Kreitzer Road was named after early Moraine pioneer, William Kreitzer who, in 1838 at age two, migrated from Pennsylvania. The Kreitzer's sold their farms, came to Moraine and settled on 120 acres of land. In 1869, William married Martha Heeter and had seven children. He continued to buy land in the area and eventually owned three sizable farms totaling 390 acres. The largest, Joseph Dryden Farm, was to the south and the others dotted the area. In the late 1800's and early 1900's Dryden Road dead ended into Kreitzer Road and did not extend north into Dayton as it does today.

In 1902 a request to extend Kreitzer Road – from the Miami River east past Springboro Pike – to Cincinnati Pike (South Dixie Drive), leading into the heart of Van Buren Township, was rejected by a Montgomery County board of reviewers. The total cost of this road extension and superstructure work on the canal bridge would have been \$4,690.

A Dayton Herald article from October 1907 stated that Montgomery County Commissioners and the County Engineer were to view the possible location of a bump bridge to be placed over the Miami & Erie Canal to connect Kreitzer Road with Springboro Road. The bump bridge would have provided the children, who lived along the lengthy stretch of Cincinnati Pike and the Miami River, a means of access to the schoolhouse

along Springboro Road, which was nearby but inaccessible without a long detour because of the canal. (A "bump bridge" or "swing bridge" is a structure that would allow a horse and buggy or wagon to pass over the canal. Canal boats would approach the bridge and bump the structure, pivoting it out of the way.) This unique solution was not approved. Instead, a small 16-foot solid bridge structure spanned the canal. Work began in April 1926 to fill the canal and eliminate the need for a bridge all together.

In July 1924 the Big Four railroad bought a tract of land from the Moraine Development Company along eastern Kreitzer Road to build another siding and extend the freight terminal facilities. And in 1927, the Moraine Lumber Company purchased six acres of land along Kreitzer Road and the B&O Railroad. Over the next 30 years, farmland was sold and more businesses, homes and mobile home parks were constructed along Kreitzer Road.

The Miami River flooding was always a concern at the west end of Kreitzer Road. This 1958 photo shows the corner of Kreitzer and East River Road as flood water threatened a house.

I remember as a five year old in 1960 walking with friends from the Gem City Mobile Home Park (where I lived) west on Kreitzer Road to where it dead ended into East River Road. We turned right and explored along the riverbank of the Miami River and along the Miami View Golf Course. A few months later that all ended as construction on Interstate 75 began and the west end of Kreitzer Road was removed.







1913 Wright Model G Aeroboat Sculpture Dedication Ceremony

On September 23, 2023, members of the Wright Seaplane Base Inc. dedicated a ¼ scale model of the 1913 Wright Model G Aeroboat Sculpture commemorating Orville Wright's 100 plus flights along the Miami River in Moraine and West Carrollton between 1912 and 1914. Snow Removal Guidelines

Senior Citizen/Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street Division provides driveway plowing services for senior citizens and handicapped residents only when snow accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please note: this is the Street Division's last priority for snow plowing. Requirements for receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note: if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. If you have any questions, please contact the Street Division at 937-535-1040.

Christmas Tree Disposal

The Street Division will be collecting Christmas trees for disposal after the holidays. If you would like to dispose of your Christmas tree, please place it at the curb for pickup.

All lights, ornaments, plastic coverings/wraps and metals must be removed from the tree prior to pick up. Items left on trees can injure employees or seriously damage the tree shredding equipment, leaving it inoperable.

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to plowing and salting of your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm consists of 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will
 greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential
 streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel throughout the City.

Know The Terms

Winter Storm Watch: There is potential of a significant winter weather event. Conditions are possible but not imminent.

Winter Weather Advisory: Winter weather is imminent and may cause inconveniences.

Winter Storm Warning: A significant winter storm is imminent and is a danger to life and property.

Blizzard Warning: A significant winter storm with strong winds, snow, and low visibility is imminent and is a danger to life and property.

Ice Storm Warning: Dangerous ice accumulations are imminent

Municipal Building Memorials

The City has two memorials to recognize our former employees and veterans.

The Police and Fire Memorial was constructed in 2012. It has two large bronze statues: one firefighter and one police officer, with plaques, as well as 275 bricks to remember our Fire and Police personnel.

The All-Veterans memorial was constructed in 2001. It has a large monument with each branch of the military, as well as 575 bricks to remember our veterans.

Bricks will be installed in early May and dedicated during the Memorial Day Ceremony.

Veterans Day: June 15th

• Bricks will be installed in early November and dedicated during the Veterans Day Ceremony.

Garden Plots 2024

Moraine has 79 garden plots located on Vance Road at the end of Dorf Drive (near the entrance to German Village). Each garden plot is 20' x 90' and costs \$15 per plot for Moraine Residents/Moraine Businesses and \$20 per plot for Non-Residents. Garden plots will be available for use starting in Early April, weather dependent.

Registration for the garden plots takes place at the Payne Recreation Center and is broken down into two phases:

Phase 1

Opens March 1st and is for all of last year's plot users who cleared their garden plot at the end of the growing year without issues.

Phase 2

Opens March 15th and is for all new gardeners.

We only guarantee the same garden plots that were used in the previous year in Phase 1, not any new plots. For example, if someone had garden plots 1 and 2, then they may reserve those same garden plots during Phase 1 only. If they wish to change the garden plot(s) they had, they must wait until after Phase 2 is finish.

Waste Collection & Recycling

The City of Dayton's Division of Waste Collection will once again be providing your waste collection services. Single or double family homes receive waste collection and recycling in Moraine at no charge to the resident.

Please have your bulk waste items, waste container, or recycle container out by 6:30 a.m. on your collection day. Please keep bulk, metal and tires separated (they are picked up by separate trucks and must be scheduled for Bulk Pick-Up). Please DO NOT place any hot items into waste or recycling containers (i.e., ashes from fireplaces). Please wrap, bag, or containerize all trash. DO NOT put loose waste out for collection.



– DO –

- Have your roll-out container or bulk items out by 6:30 a.m. the day of your scheduled waste collection. Remember, you have a collection day, not a collection time.
- Keep bulk and metal items separated (they're picked up by a separate truck).
- Keep yard waste separated from other collection items (it also must be cut and tied in 4-foot lengths no larger than 18 inches in diameter).
- Place container at least 5 feet away from any object (cars, mailboxes, trees, etc.).
- Always allow 3 feet between containers.
- Place containers at curb (or alley) with handles facing house.
- Remove containers from curb line, alley or front yard no later than 8 a.m. on the day after your collection day.

— DON'T —

- Overfill roll-out (lid should be closed on roll-out).
- Place any hot items in roll-out (ie., ashes from fireplace).
- Place roll-out close to any obstruction (such as an automobile).
- Put loose trash in roll-out (wrap or bag all trash).
- Have trash piled on or around roll-out.

Waste Collection

Waste collection is scheduled every Friday with the exception of weeks containing a holiday. All waste collection services will then be moved to the following day. Residents must purchase their own waste containers with a lid.

Recycling Collection

Recycling is also collected every Friday with trash collection. If you are interested in recycling and would like to obtain a FREE 95-gallon blue City of Dayton recycling container, please call the Call Center at 937-333-4800 and one will be scheduled for delivery. All recyclable material must be loosely placed inside the 95-gallon blue recycle container. Please consult the Recycle Right reference guide for items that are and are not accepted in the recycle container.

Acceptable items for recycling are: glass bottles and jars (all colors); metal cans – aluminium cans, steel cans and lids, empty aerosol cans with the lids and tips removed; plastic bottles (empty, crushed, with caps/lids removed) – bottles and jugs that have a small mouth and wider base, such as milk jugs, soda bottles, laundry detergent bottles, water bottles, shampoo bottles and contact solution bottles; paper – newspaper, magazines, cardboard, mixed office paper and envelopes, paper board (cereal boxes), pizza boxes free of food debris and grease, telephone books and catalogs; cartons – food and beverage cartons, such as milk, juice, soup, wine, broth and other cartons.

All recycling materials may be mixed together – no separation required. Empty all bottles, jugs and cans (no need to remove labels); for plastic bottles, remove caps/lids; for cartons, remove plastic caps and straws. Never place medical sharps or needles in the recycling. Do not use plastic bags.

Bulk Waste Collection

All bulk waste collections must be scheduled in advance and will be collected every other Friday. Some large items cannot be thrown away because they are too big to fit in your trash container. Bulk items include, but are not limited to, furniture, carpet, metal appliances, mattresses, refrigerators and stoves. Call 937-333-4800, no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day, to schedule a bulk waste collection. Set items out by 6:30 a.m. the day of your scheduled bulk collection. If your regular trash is picked up at the curb, place bulk items in front of your home away from obstructions on your specially scheduled collection day. Bundle, bag or containerize all small items. (Keep your neighborhood clean of loose debris.) Roll carpet into a bundle 4 feet long by 2 feet in diameter and tie it with rope. Leave furniture assembled. Tie brush, tree limbs, and carpet into bundles not heavier than 25 pounds, no larger than 4 feet in length, and no bigger than 18 inches in diameter. Yard waste (brush, clippings, tree limbs, etc.) must be tied into bundles not larger than 4 feet long and 18 inches in diameter. Bundles are limited to 25 pounds each. Glass must be taped. Residents are responsible for cleaning up any glass residue that may remain on the ground in front of their home as a result of collection. The City of Dayton cannot collect: sheet rock (drywall), concrete, rocks, bricks, blocks, sand, gravel, paint, construction materials, or hazardous waste. (Examples of hazardous waste are paint, oil, gas containers, etc.)

Bulk pick-ups are limited to (5) five large items and/or up to (25) small bags or boxes. Items resulting from an eviction, (set or take-out) and move outs, or foreclosure will not be collected. THESE ARE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PROPERTY OWNER.

City of Dayton Holidays for Waste and Recycling

Waste and recycling are not collected on holidays. On weeks containing a holiday, waste collection service will be moved back one day following the holiday. For example, if your waste collection day is typically on Monday, but that day is a holiday, your garbage will be collected on Tuesday; Tuesday's normal collection will then move to Wednesday, and so on, through Friday moving to Saturday.

City of Dayton holidays are New Year's Day, MLK Day, Good Friday, Memorial Day, Juneteenth, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

Moraine awards Medal of Valor to Sgt. Ken Lloyd, Officers Paul Land, Tyler Dennis and Karen Arriaga-Perez for deliberate acts of heroism following shooting.

When officers responded to reports of a shooting at the DMAX factory in Moraine earlier this year, they had no idea how chaotic a scene they would be encountering.

Four of the first officers on the scene of the incident at 3100 Dryden Road in May were recognized Thursday at a council meeting "for their deliberate acts of heroism which involved extreme risk to their safety," with each of them being awarded the Moraine Police Division's Medal of Valor.

"It is my firm belief that the immediate, selfless, decisive actions of these responding officers saved countless lives that day," said Moraine Police Chief Craig Richardson. "Their actions make me proud to be their chief and they are heroes." The Medal of Valor is Moraine Police Department's highest honor and the first time in its history that it has been awarded, he said.
