


MORAINE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM PARTNERSHIP AWARDS

Last year the City of Moraine had 4,089 hours of volunteer service administered by 1,265 participants. The City of Moraine appreciates each individual that volunteered and every accomplishment that they made whether they volunteered just one hour, dozens of hours or hundreds of hours. The City appreciates all of the volunteers who give time to assist at City of Moraine departments, special events, classes and community cleanups.

Recently celebrating National Volunteer Month, the Moraine Volunteer Program recognized several outstanding volunteers for their efforts in 2018.

Joe Garvey, Karen Garvey, Justin Eller and Holly Miller were recognized for their hard work beautifying our parks, bike trails and hiking trails through the monthly Community Cleanups. Although all four volunteered in many other areas in 2018, they participated in the majority of the cleanups cutting back overgrown branches and weeds, picking up litter, removing fallen branches and recycling bottles. "These four volunteers use the trails weekly, either jogging, walking or biking. They have a vested interest in keeping the trails clean for them and for others," stated Dave Miller, Volunteer Program Coordinator.



In the business category, the Moraine Volunteer Program recognized DMAX employees. Plant employees held a cleanup of Dryden Road and Northlawn Blvd. where employees walked over 1.3 miles picking up litter and recycling bottles. Other DMAX employees adopted flowerbeds at the City of Moraine Gerhardt Civic Center, keeping them weed free & beautiful for five months. DMAX employees planted and maintained a

beautiful flowerbed on a Dryden Road median strip island. DMAX employees provided a free lunch for the Moraine Police & Fire Divisions as a way of supporting and saying thank you to our first responders.

In the club category, the Moraine Volunteer Program thanked the Kettering Fairmont High School National Honor Society. Throughout the year students volunteered at many community cleanup projects and assisted staff at dozens of recreation classes, special events and programs. Over forty NHS students volunteered in 2018.







RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

THE AVIATION THEME BEHIND PINNACLE RIDGE SUBDIVISION Part 1

Moraine has a rich aeronautical history from the Wright Brothers to the Moraine Airpark to barnstorming air show pilot Harold Johnson. Located beside one of the famous Wright Brothers sites, the Pinnacles, is the newly developed Pinnacle Ridge housing subdivision. Pinnacle Ridge, located in northwest Moraine, has a aviation theme to the streets: Amelia Way in honor of Amelia Earhart (first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean); Bessie Avenue in honor of Bessie Coleman (first woman of African-American descent and of Native American descent to hold a pilot's license & became a successful air show pilot); Charles Court, in honor of Charles Lindbergh (first person to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean) and also in honor Charles "Chuck" Yeager (the first pilot confirmed to have exceeded the speed of sound in level flight).

Today's article we look at the aviatress behind one of the subdivision street names, Amelia Earhart.

Amelia Mary Earhart was born on July 24, 1897 and disappeared July 2, 1937. Earhart was an American aviation pioneer, author and was the first female aviator to fly solo across the Atlantic Ocean. She received the United States Distinguished Flying Cross for this accomplishment. She set many other records, wrote best-selling books about her flying experiences and was instrumental in the formation of The Ninety-Nines, an organization for female pilots. In 1935, Earhart became a visiting faculty member at Purdue University as an advisor to aeronautical engineering and a career counselor to women students.

During an attempt to make a circumnavigational flight all around the earth in 1937 in a Purdue-funded Lockheed Model 10-E Electra, Earhart and navigator Fred Noonan disappeared over the central Pacific Ocean near Howland Island. Fascination with her life, career, and disappearance continues to this day.



CAN-TASTIC

Each year we receive complaints about trash cans being left out in the open before and after trash day as well as trash not being properly placed in approved cans. Please refer to Moraine's Codified Ordinance 923.05 (MCO) which states the following.



923.05 PLACING CONTAINERS FOR COLLECTION

It shall be the duty of the owner, occupant or person in charge of premises to place or cause to be placed not earlier than twenty-four hours prior to or later than 7am on the days scheduled for the collection of waste from the premises, the vessels or containers containing waste materials in the yard in a readily accessible location so as to be easily seen by waste collectors. This applies to both alley and street collections. No owner, occupant or person in charge of the premises shall place any vessels or containers containing waste materials or any waste materials not in containers or vessels in their yard or in public view earlier that twenty-four hours prior to a scheduled collection. (Ord. 743-86. Passed 2/27/86)

Please remember to place all of your trash cans out of view before and after trash day either on the side or rear of your house or in your garage or shed. Also keep all trash in approved containers with a proper secured lid so it does not attract unwanted animals and bugs. The simple task of keeping your cans out of sight and sealed properly will have a positive effect on your home, neighborhood and cities appearance.

1414.02 DISPOSAL OF RUBBISH OR GARBAGE.

Every owner or occupant of occupied premises, shall dispose of all rubbish or garbage in a clean and sanitary manner by placing such rubbish or garbage in approved leak-proof, covered containers. All containers, dumpsters, or trash receptacles shall be kept closed or covered at all times. The premises around all rubbish or garbage containers shall be kept free from glass, garbage, rubbish, or debris.

(Ord. 1459-02. Passed 5-9-02.)

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

Bus Behavior

• Talk to your children about the importance of behaving responsibly on the bus. By listening to the bus driver and sitting quietly, your kids are doing their part to help make the ride safer.

Break for Buses

When you are following a school bus, make sure to come to a complete stop in your vehicle. Always watch for kids
playing near the edge of the road. When you see a stopped school bus, never attempt to pass the bus.

Clothing Consciousness

Remember to make sure that your child wears appropriate clothing when they walk to and from bus stops during
poor weather conditions. Do not let your child wear loose-fitting clothing that could get caught somewhere on
the bus. Also, make sure that your child's backpack fits snuggly against their body to avoid injury from it catching on something. Avoid loose hanging strings or cords.

Teach Your Children Bus Safety

• If your child is new to riding the bus, teach him how to get to and from the bus stop as well as on and off the bus; also explain what's expected of him as he rides the bus.

Waiting for the Bus

- · Be at the bus stop on time.
- · Stay away from the curb while waiting quietly for the bus.
- · Wait for the bus to come to a complete stop before boarding.
- · Be patient while getting on and off the bus by boarding and exiting one at a time.
- · Never play or stand in the aisles; sit down in a seat while the bus is in motion.

Riding the Bus

- · Stay seated throughout the bus ride.
- · Don't stick or drop anything out of the windows.
- · Listen to the bus driver and follow their instructions.
- · Talk quietly with your friends.
- · Don't throw anything in the bus.

Boarding and Exiting the Bus

- Stay ten (10) feet from the bus at all times, it is hard for the driver to see you.
- To ensure eye contact with the driver, take ten (10) giant steps beyond the front bumper of the bus before you turn to cross the street.
- · Look both ways before crossing the street and wait for the driver's signal.
- · NEVER cross the street behind the bus!
- Keep away from the bus if you drop or forget something.

Did You Know?

Passing a school bus that is stopped carries up to a \$500 fine and a mandatory court appearance.

Christmas Smiles Application Process for Parents and Guardians of Moraine Children

APPLY IN PERSON - OCTOBER 19, 21, 26 OR 28

Qualifying for the Program

- School age child must be on free or reduced lunch program through their school. Qualifications for the free or reduced lunch program will be validated through his or her school.
- Each child must be a Moraine resident.
- Each child must be between the ages of newborn to 17 at the time of application.

Apply IN PERSON

Parent or guardian must apply in person at the Municipal Building

- Saturdays October 19 or October 26 from 1pm 3pm or
- Mondays October 21 or October 28 from 5:30pm 7:30pm
- Applications will not be accepted over the phone or in written form.
 - * You must bring proof of Moraine residency with parent or guardian's name on the document. Acceptable proof is a water, gas or electric bill in your name with your current address listed on the bill. Your utility bill must be dated within 30 days prior to the application date or it will not be accepted. Cable bills, insurance statements, tax receipts, etc. will not be accepted as proof of residency.
 - * You must bring your photo ID. Parent or guardian must have a picture ID such as a Driver's License or State Issued ID.
 - * The parent or guardian must bring an official certified birth certificate or court issued documentation of custody for each child.
 - * Please have shirt, pants and shoe sizes and a list of items the child would like for Christmas. We cannot guarantee the child will receive items listed.
 - * Christmas Smiles cannot give out high-end electronic items like iPods, cell phones, or game systems.

Notification

- Parent or guardian will be notified by mail if application is accepted.
- If accepted, a postcard will be sent in the mail the last week in November as a reminder to pick up gift boxes.

Pick-Up

- Parent Pick-Up Day is December 14 at the GCC from 1pm 2:30pm
- In order to pick-up your gift box, YOU MUST BRING:
 - * Picture ID.
 - * The reminder post card received by the parent or guardian. NOTE: All IDs and post cards will be checked. If IDs and post cards are not present at the time of pick-up, the gift box will not be given.
- Any gifts that are not picked up on December 14 will be donated to a local charity.
